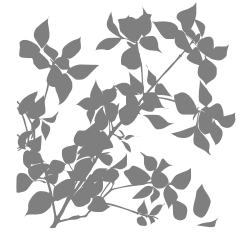

## 3 Villages, 2 Parishes, 1 Team

*'We have had one cat killed by a speeding car, and a dog who got out one day and was run over at a cost of approximately £800 in vet bills. The cat (vehicle) stopped. The dog (vehicle) did not.'*

*'... in 2017 I saw 3 dead cats (road kill), 2 opposite Holly Lodge, both on the road, and the other one near Moat Farm...'*

*'...cat Minty was hit by a car but was luckily not killed. I think this was near Rowan Cottage.'*

*'[Our dog] was also hit on the road when he was young. He and we were very lucky, the car only caught him with a glancing blow leaving tyre black on his fur. It did not stop.'*

*'...had a cat killed on the road in our early days in LT.'*

*'...and a chicken!'*

We wanted to get a full picture of the pattern of the speed of vehicles on Long Thurlow Road, so in January we put two flashing SIDs in the 30mph zone, facing in opposite directions.

Our SID was at the bus shelter, which is in Great Ashfield. It counted 13,661 vehicles driving towards Badwell Ash. Of those 7,718 were travelling at 35mph or more; 24 were travelling at 60mph or more.

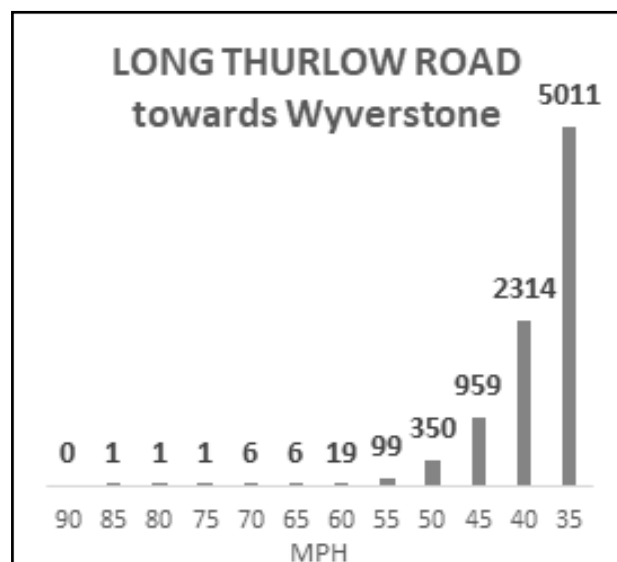
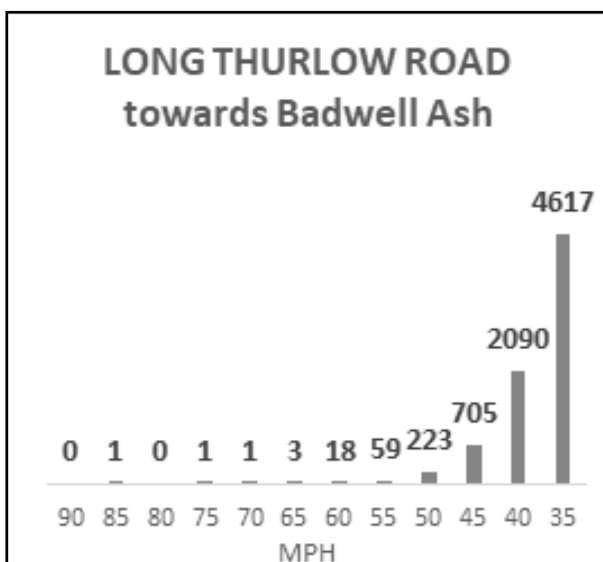
The Badwell Ash SID was on the pole opposite Holly Lodge. It counted 21,345 vehicles driving towards Wyverstone. Of those 8,767 were travelling at 35mph or more; 34 were travelling at 60mph or more.

So **three** villages, **two** Parishes, but **one** strong team working together to make our roads safer. Please join us if you would like to help.

## Parish Council News

The council has met twice since the last newsletter.

The precept (parish funding from council tax) has been raised for the first time in many years. The increase from £1,900 to £2,300 represents approximately £1 per person per year. Our assets now need maintenance; the Millennium Book, the Village sign and the contribution to the new mini SID have cost £1,245 in 2017. This is in addition to regular outgoings (electricity, dog waste bins, rent, insurance etc.) that now exceed the old precept value.

We have had a request to receive this newsletter via email. If any residents want to do this please email the council at [greatashfieldpc@outlook.com](mailto:greatashfieldpc@outlook.com). This address can also be used for general items but please note that it is not reviewed frequently.

At the time of writing the floods on Elmswell Road and Daisy Green are with Highways for review. Thanks to Roy for digging out the Elmswell Road ditch to alleviate that one. We have rodded and jetted the Daisy Green drains but need the field drain water level to subside before we can safely take more action.

In this issue we have a Community Speed Watch update and a note on the 'WWI Beacons of Light 11 November 2018'. We need your help to complete the stories of those who fought in WWI.

The next meeting is at 7.30pm on **Thursday, 29 March** in the Lord Thurlow Hall. Other meetings in 2018 are scheduled for 31 May, 27 September and 29 November.

The Annual Parish Meeting is 7.00pm on 31 May.

## TOAD TIME! DRIVERS TAKE CARE!

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## Church News

### Community Breakfast with TOAST at its Heart

Having lost one service a month recently, members of our church realised that we have the opportunity to introduce a new monthly venture. Our church members want our building to remain open and useful into the future. We have been investigating similar undertakings in other village churches and would like to offer this to our own community.

**BREAKFAST** will be served in All Saints' Church from 9.30am on the fourth Sunday of each month: quality coffee, tea and juices; lots of **TOASTed** items, with home-made marmalade, jams, honey and other spreads. The selection will evolve with the time of year.

**TOAST** stands for Talking Over A Small Table so about 9.45am a thought for the day will be introduced on a theme from one of the big questions in life. Then, that theme will continue in discussions round the pew tables, using cards with easy but thought-provoking questions. This is not a 'church service', rather an opportunity to consider the questions of life in a Christian setting and community, exploring with Christian friends.

It is also an ideal opportunity to respond to the often-asked question: 'What about a village Sunday School?' At TOAST children will now be able to hear Bible stories and explore Christian values in fun activities, after having breakfast with their parents. Everyone can then come back together again for a prayer on the theme of the day.

We are also considering having a borrowing/swapping library of books in the church.

## Barker's Babberlings

There are three things I want to touch on:

### 1. Waste collections

Thank you for being understanding about the waste collections over the Christmas/New Year break. Everything went smoothly from the Council point of view, it is not every year we have to collect two days late. Thanks once again.

### 2. Highways

If there are any problems with the highways, potholes, water and verges, please visit the Suffolk County Council website <http://www.suffolk.gov.uk>\* It is easy to follow and the more hits the better (on their website not pothole hits!), as they will do repairs more quickly than if a pothole has only one report. *Don't leave it to others - help by reporting and saying it is dangerous.* I have a tyre to claim for from SCC due to pothole damage last week!!

### 3. Council tax

The budget for next year is in the process of completion. It looks like a rise of under 1% from Mid Suffolk District Council: £3 approximately per year on a band D property. Suffolk County Council is going for a 4.99% rise: approximately £75 per year on a band D property. And the Police element around 5% rise: approximately £9 per year on a Band D property. Councils are really struggling and cannot cut services any further.

## WORLD WAR I COMMEMORATION

*In commemoration and remembrance of the end of the war and the many millions who were killed or came home dreadfully wounded, 1000 Beacons of Light will be lit at 7pm on 11 November 2018 throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories - a century after the guns fell silent.\**

*Great Ashfield has successfully registered as one of the 1000 beacon sites. Planning is at an early stage but we are keen to prepare a welcome pack for village households that would include information on the lives of those who fought in WWI. To date we have 65 individuals, of whom 55 survived but more information is always welcome.*
