Parish Council Summary for 2017-18

The council has met seven times this year including specific planning meetings. Over the year ten planning applications were referred by Mid Suffolk (MSDC) and all were approved, albeit with appropriate comments where needed.

We have had to increase the precept for the first time in many years, from £1900 to £2300. Regular expenditure is now at £2150 per annum and last year we spent an additional £1400 on asset repairs and the contribution to the mini SID speed indicator sign. New data protection rules (GDPR) mean that from May we may have to pay for a Data Protection Officer.

The big issues remain highways and for some residents broadband.

Broadband: we were fortunate when Ian Sadler volunteered to join us in October. He has tracked broadband issues and been active in their progress to resolution. At the time of writing new cabinets support much of our village and Ian is trialling a mobile service that may help the 'narrowband' users between the main roads.

Highways: the two issues that arise most are potholes and speeding. The rate of pothole filling seems to have improved lately but vigilance is needed to spot and report issues online.

Community Speed Watch: last year I wrote that we had the poles for the mini SID and were supporting the set-up of Community Speed Watch (CSW) in partnership with Badwell Ash and Long Thurlow. The mini SID has arrived and been deployed to good effect. Thanks again to the *Great Ashfield Playing Field Association*, Roy as *District Councillor* and Jane as *County Councillor* who all made contributions to the cost of the mini SID. Data captured in Long Thurlow has been verified by the police and they are planning to set up enforcement visits there twice a month. Recent data on Elmswell Road was eye opening and we hope similar police action will follow.

In October we were invited to respond to the County's Local Plan which covered housing development, industry, transport etc. A working party met and made 61 responses or comments. Hopefully these reflected the feedback we received from residents.

This year marks the centenary of the end of WWI. We have been pleased to receive background information on Great Ashfield and the lives of people who lived here during WWI (see one of these on page 4, an excerpt from the School Log Book in the run up to the War). If you can help with more stories about people or life in the village at that time, then please contact any councillor.

Finally my thanks to all the Parish Councillors for their time, ideas and effort this year (tree planting, dog bin repair, CSW liaison, broadband meetings, making salt boxes, making the books balance, rodding drains and so much more); also to Sandra for keeping us in order. For a small parish we seem to have punched above our weight this year. We are always happy to see you at any meeting.

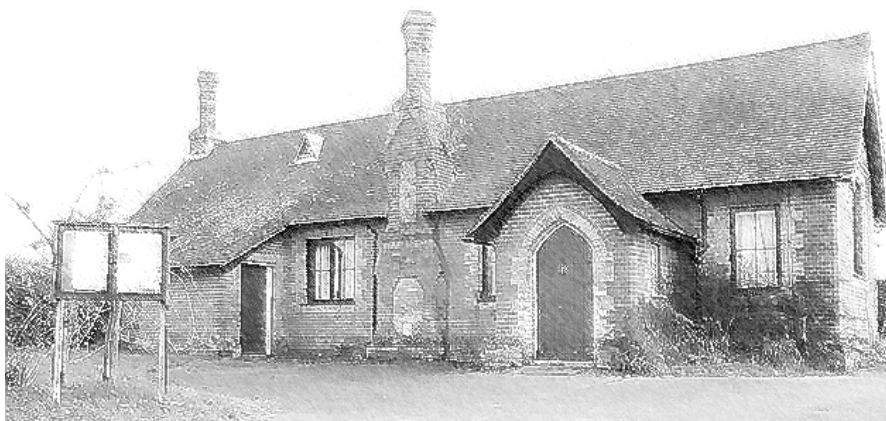

ASHFIELD MAGNA SCHOOL LOG BOOK

The months leading up to the outbreak of War in August 1914



Copy of inspection report of *January 14th 1914* received *June 1914*

The order is satisfactory.

Infant class is well managed and taught.

Upper School

Reading and composition is restricted in scope and of average merit.

Arithmetic, wanting in accuracy, a few children did good work but there is a considerable sector backward in this subject. A definite scheme of work should be drawn up and proper records kept.

The Upper School needs different books to the Lower. The existing practice of copying matter from their books has not helped them retain much information or take much interest on their work hence the poor response to questions in history.

Reading books are old and dilapidated.

Poetry books are needed.

Drawing is moderate.

Nature records are good but need to be kept tidily.

Boys need practice in scale drawing.

Drill should be more smartly performed, little was done to point out faults and improve their work.

Staff are sufficient, classes small so they should be able to keep the children actively interested so that the older and quicker children do not slacken.

The Headmistress in 1914

On **August 31st 1914** Annie Perring, the Headmistress, resigned. Annie was from Little Chesterford near Saffron Walden. In April 1914 fire broke out there and spread up the High Street destroying the Crown Inn amongst other dwellings. There were no casualties, but only one barrel of beer could be saved! Annie's grandfather had been the publican in 1871. Annie may have left to look after her mother, Emma, aged 83, who lived near the Inn.
